INTRODUCTION to the use of catalogue

History of the perfins is closely combined with the existence of the decree 6040 permitting perforation of the stamps in Hungary from 24 th March 1877.

Since 1886 postal stationary, orders and as well as other dispatch notes were permitted to be perfored. As Slovakia at that time was a part of Greater Hungary, its first perfins occured on Hungarian stamps. In the following period they occured on the stamps of the Czechoslovak Republic I, the Slovak State, Hungary(and in the part of the country that was occupied by Hungary in 1938 - 1944), the Czechoyak republic II.

Application of the perfins

In the area of Slovak Republic 74 perfins have been recognized so far(Fig. 6) from 18 places. Fifty one perfins have been identified directly from identification full covers and 6 indirectly (from a telephone directory, firm catalogues, etc.) A user has not been identified on 17 perfins (column 3). The perfins were used by 65 companies; because more than one type of the perfin was applied by 5 companies (in Bratislava 4 companies and in Kosice 1 company).

Collecting perfins

Collecting the perfins has a lot of in common with collecting stamps. Used stamps unglued from the envelopes are collected, individual full covers, cut outs, perfin's postage stamps respectively unused stamps with a perfin are collected. The stamps on the full covers with a logo of a firm,it's address, with the company activities, in additions with outlets will be preserved intact. They are considered to be a valuable source of information about the user of a perfin. Similarly larger units of perfins (tapes, blocks of four etc.) are not divided on principle. They are very important

for an identification of possible multiperfin (see perfin F 4, W 4 and others) but also for identification of docimiles, a date of application according the postmarks.

Perfins can be collected according to their position on the stamps (see p.9). There are 8 positions on the whole which are based on the basic position (1/0) and reversed (2/0). Further positions are created by turning the stamps by 90 degrees clockwise the other positions correspond with 3, 6, 9, in the numerator. The above mentioned positions differ from the positions published in Semmler's catalogue of the Hungarian perfins.

Collecting perfins with different positions is a matter of the personal decision of a stamp - collector and this matter is viewed from different aspects.

Quality of Perfin

The same criteria are required as for other philatelic materials. (intact, clear and legible postmark, full covers without scrapes, not folded etc.) The perfin itself should be on the the stamp intact, very well centered and clearly rouletted.
